Accountability & Succession

Responsible representation is the name of the game for the ULSU. While advocacy for students is essential, so is staying accountable to students and preparing for the future of the ULSU. Thus, there are many policies and measures in place to ensure that students' money and interests are protected for current and future student bodies. Much of what is done is behind the scenes, but, as will be illustrated, are affective means in staying transparent, responsible, and effective representatives of the student body.

Every year the ULSU puts together numerous internal committees. Each GA member is obligated to sit on at least one committee, and non-elected students who are interested in ULSU student life planning are also welcome to join. Ranging from dealing with upcoming social events, to going through bylaws and policies with a finetooth comb, these committees are vital in ensuring that the direction the ULSU is pursuing, is in consolation with a wide range of students from different backgrounds and will have an overall lasting affect on campus.

One committee in particular, the Executive Accountability Committee (EAC), is put together every year to ensure that the ULSU executive members are on the right track. The EAC is responsible for surveying the GA and the ULSU staff with regards to how effective in their job they think the Executive Council are doing. This information is then collected, organized, and presented to the Executive Council. This critical examination of the Executive Council aids in ensuring that each of them are on track with the goals they made at the beginning of the year, notes what they are good at and what they need to improve on, and helps to ensure that there are no issues with how students are being represented.

Even though the EAC deals with the here and now, there

keeps the ULSU accountable and focused on bettering today's students and those of the future.

While only a few examples have been provided, it must be understood that the ULSU is actively thinking about students at all times. In the past year alone, great head-way has been made with the promotion of what actually goes on within student

Student Engagement Committee

University Affairs

While 2011-2012 wasn't necessarily a banner year for the University, there were many notable developments which will undoubtedly improve the quality of education and student life on campus. The top achievements which come to my mind are; beginning construction of the new residence building, the creation of the alumni Fiat Lux ring, commencing the planning for a new science building, and approving the creation of an online student portal. CAUS Involvement

The Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS) had an incredible year in 2011-2012, we had numerous lobbying successes and challenges and ran an exciting election campaign. Serving as Chair of CAUS, I put an incredible amount of effort into the organization, and am very proud of the work our team accomplished. Our year began on the right note when we began lobbying the leadership candidates for all parties on the idea of improving Alberta's post-secondary participation rate from last to first. Alison Redford, who was a leadership candidate at the time, latched onto this idea and included our ideas directly in her postsecondary platform (which she announced in the SUB). While she hasn't made a clear commitment to making our participation rate the highest in the nation, she has made efforts to improve participation for rural and aboriginal students and will likely keep this statistic in mind when forming PSE policy in the future. Liberal leader, Raj Sherman, also took hold of this idea, it was a large part of the Liberal campaign narrative: it was a

major piece of the Liberal campaign platform, and was included in Raj's comments during the Leaders Debate.

On the opposite side of things, non-instructional fees, a top priority for us, were easily the most frustrating issue we had to deal with this year. We had been lobbying the Government to regulate noninstructional fees by making it mandatory for any new fee or large increase to existing fees, be approved by student referendum or student council vote. After months of fighting, and coming to what seemed like an agreement with Minister Weadick, he asked each institution to create their own non-instructional fee policy and released a list of "Best Practices" for our institutions to follow. The best practices ignored nearly everything we had discussed prior and simply formalized the status quo in the favour of institutions. While he is no longer Minister, Greg Weadick made it clear that this file was not yet closed, and I am confident that the CAUS 2012-2013 Council will be able to make further progress on this file in a new political climate.

We also lobbied the Government on increasing the level of non-repayable assistance it provides to students through its SFA program. We were asking the Government to invest more in scholarships, loans, bursaries, and debt remission, as opposed to simply relying on student loans. A portion of our specific request was recognized when Advanced Education and Technology announced changes to SFA and simplified the remission system. Additionally, the Government removed parental contributions, part time earnings, and savings, from the student loan assessment and introduced a flat rate contribution of \$1,500. This will give students greater access to student loans, and was a major win for CAUS.

Finally, in the recommendations we gave to the Government for Budget 2012 we advocated for an increase and stability in the operating grants that the Government provides to our institutions. Sure enough, in the Budget the Government announced a 2% grant

our institutions to pursue large tuition or fee increases.

In summary, it was an incredible year both for me personally and for CAUS. We had an excellent team with world class support, had our share of successes and setbacks, and I was honored to work with such an outstanding group. CAUS Initiative: Get Out The Vote

Faced with a Provincial Election within a year, the Council of Alberta University Students began to plan an election campaign during our first days in office. The result was the Get Out The Vote Campaign: a direct voter contact campaign which had the sole goal of maximizing student voter turnout. Our idea was simple, we got students to pledge to vote and provide us with their contact information and used it to create a database of student voters. Using the database, we contacted all of the students during the campaign and the election to remind them to get out and vote.

After preparing through summer and fall, we had over 10,000 Alberta students pledge to vote by the drop of

the writ, including 2,000 at the University of Lethbridge. When we released these numbers and launched our campaign in the first days of the Provincial Election we earned an incredible amount of media province wide. The following candidates debate and vote mob earned even more media and continued to reinforce our message to the public and the parties: students were voting in this election. Finally, on election day we set up a call center with a group of excited volunteers and contacted every single UofL student on our list.

Voter turnout increased nearly double in Lethbridge West than it did in bordering ridings; I know GOTV was a large part of that. With the success of this campaign, we've let the Government know that students are engaged and voting. I'm glad to pass this image down to future CAUS councils and have no doubt that they will be able to use it to advance the student agenda. It was an incredible experience to have played a leadership role in Get Out The Vote, and I was ecstatic to have ended our year on a such a high note. CASA Involvement

The ULSU remained an active member within CASA, (the Canadian Alliance of Student Associations). CASA upheld its mandate to help better post-secondary education for students in Canada.

The ULSU played a large part in the internal organization of CASA this year. Leyland Bradley, VP Operations & Finance, served as Vice Chair for the ad-hoc Member Relations Committee. The Member Relations Committee

was relevant in discussing issues pertaining to membership size and growth, the member's feedback on CASA's Strategic Plan, and discussing a new membership website which would help CASA members keep up to date on current issues. The committee stressed the possibility of making the Member Relations Committee a standing committee for the future. This was well received, especially from Home Office as a means to ensure adequate communication between members and staff.

For our advocacy efforts, the ULSU met with many Members of Parliament while at Lobby Conference in Ottawa, Ontario, such as Lethbridge MP Jim Hillyer, Re-

gina MP Tom Lukiwiski, Northwest Territories MP Dennis Bevington, and Southern Interior, British Columbia MP Alex Atamanenko. CASA's most pressing issues for post-secondary students included eliminating the 2 per cent cap on annual funding for the Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP) to allow greater numbers of Aboriginal Canadians the opportunity to succeed in post-secondary, ending the private tax on student textbooks

million a year), allowing multiple-entry visas for international students in Canada and abolishing the \$150 fee for international students to work off campus, and exempting vehicle ownership from the Canadian Student Loans Program (CSLP) as a borrower asset. The issues were well-

received from government, with promising strides being taken in a reassessment in both the PSSSP and the CSLP.

The CASA Annual General Meeting was held in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Internally speaking, the membership agreed to have Zachary Dayler continue on another year in his position as National Director. There was discussion about potentially making tax credit reassessment a lobby prior-





ity for next year which was heavily debated but it may be a definitive lobby issue. There was also discussion about going forward with joining The Right to Research Coalition, an organization dedicated to open access to copyright journals and other academic work to help ensure students have access to adequate resources.

Overall, CASA made strong efforts to build itself internally and accomplish many advocacy initiatives during 2011-2012. Written by Leyland Bradley - 4th year Sociology major

This year there were over 80 ratified clubs, up from around 70 last year. The clubs began activities and membership recruitment early, with approximately 20 ratified clubs attending New Student Orientation. This gave new students a chance to see some of the clubs on campus before classes even started. Next up for clubs was Club Rush Week where they all had the opportunity to set up booths in the University Hall Atrium to recruit new club members.

Once the semester was in full swing, clubs started hosting their many events. Events such as fundraisers, seminars, workshops, lectures, meet and greets, cabarets, potlucks, competitions, social gatherings, and more. Clubs hosted a number of annual

events, such as EDGE's Jail and Bail, Rotaract's Dinner and Silent Auction, and the JDC West's Chillin' for Charity. Some were held once a semester such as the Object Manipulation Club's cabarets, and some were hosted weekly, such as the Medieval Club's sparring nights, the Yoga Club's free yoga classes, or the Long Board Club's Shred Nights in the Zoo. These could not have been hosted without the outstanding dedication of the club executives and their members.

Lethbridge, I would like to sincerely congratulate all club members for the hard work that they have demonstrated this year. You should all be very proud!



Club Benefits

Throughout the year clubs receive thousands of dollars in monetary funding by way of grants, donations and prizes. There is also a large amount of operational costs that the ULSU absorbs in order for clubs to receive their benefits for free. These benefits amounted to over \$46,000 for such things as club rooms, space bookings, equipment usage, and insurance. In total, club benefits added up to \$87,059 for 2011-2012.







Support to Club Initiatives

Jail and Bail - EDGE

This new club started their first year with a bang by hosting a 'Jail and Bail' event. Students, staff, faculty, community members and the ULSU Executive Council were held 'hostage' in the UHall Atrium. They were released once they had raised enough money by approaching friends and passing students for financial donations. In a single day they raised approximately \$8,000 toward building a school in Afghanistan.

Chillin' for Charity - JDC West

As a fundraiser for the JDC West Business Competition, the JDC West club hosted their annual Chillin' for Charity event on November 4th. This featured an outdoor pool filled with icy water. JDC West teams consisting of students, faculty, staff, and the ULSU Executive Council all made the plunge into the freezing cold water to help raise money for the United Way of Lethbridge and South Western Alberta.

Dinner and Silent Auction - Rotaract Club

On February 4th, the ULSU attended Rotaract's 7th annual dinner and Silent Auction. This event was hosted to raise money to build a school in south Sudan. The night was entitled 'Guir ku baai' meaning 'let's build together.' The night raised \$14,500 through ticket sales, silent auction items, 50/50 draws, and financial donations.

OUTspoken - PRIDE Centre

The ULSU was proud to be one of the primary financial sponsors for the PRIDE Centre's third annual OUTspoken event from March 21st to 24th. OUTspoken featured workshops, seminars, speakers, and social events. Shoe Drive

Mobile App

Sustainability on Campus

Sustainability on campus from an institutional stand-point took major strides this year. This year also saw the expansion of the compost project on campus. Compost bins were brought into Pikani Residence for their personal use. Additionally, our first public compost bins were setup at various locations on campus for the entire campus community to use. 







GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPORTS

The Management Students Society (MSS) has also had

a strong year holding events and fundraisers such as the Business on the Fairway Golf Tournament, the Etiquette Dinner, the Powder Burn Ski Trip, 5 Days For the Homeless, and many more. Education Rep Report

The Faculty of Education continues to provide the highest quality of education for the up-and-coming teachers at the University of Lethbridge. Not only is the program competitive, but it also offers an exceptional amount of practicum time, allowing students to improve their skills in and out of the classroom.

The Education Undergraduate Society (EUS) is a student group comprised of Education students, working together on common initiatives and goals. Students are provided with opportunities for professional development, tutoring, volunteering, and conference/workshop attendance. In October, the EUS held its 4th Annual Anti-Bullying and Cyberbullying Awareness Week. Four sessions were available over the course of the week, and it was, as always, a huge success. The fall semester also held the annual Bust-the-Backpack campaign, which put PSI students in a healthy competition against their respective sections, collecting school supplies and funds. Collectively, 46 backpacks were filled with supplies to be donated to schools across Southern Alberta. This almost doubles the number raised last year! Across both semesters, a variety of Professional Development sessions were offered on topics ranging from using SmartBoards in the classroom, to teaching abroad. These were also well attended.

On January 18th, the U of L held it's annual Teacher Job Fair, where students who were completing their degree could begin their search for employment. Over 40 school boards and other educational organizations came to the University, with some even conducting

interviews on campus. This job fair is one of the reasons that the Faculty of Education can boast a 97% employment rate for the graduates of the B.Ed. program. The University was also home to the annual South Western

Alberta Teachers' Convention Association (SWATCA). During Reading Week, over 2000 educators, and over 200 education students in PSII took part in a huge assortment of professional development and personal development sessions. The keynote speaker was Rick Hansen, a paraplegic who began the Man in Motion tour, crossing Canada and 33 other countries in a wheelchair to raise money and awareness for spinal cord injury research.

Finally, the ULSU paired with the EUS to hold a fundraiser in support of PSII student scholarships. Throughout February, clothing bins were set up around campus for students and staff to drop off gently used clothing donations. After collecting over 500 articles of clothing, a used clothing sale was hosted on February 28th and 29th in the Students' Union ballrooms. We raised \$300 to put towards this scholarship fund, continuing our support of education students.

Board of Governors Rep Report

The Board of Governors is one of two governing bodies of the University of Lethbridge. The General Faculties Council (GFC) deals with all academic issues and the board deals with all financial and administrative issues of the university.

The board consists of three students, as well as faculty, staff, alumni, and members of the public. The students on the board are the Graduate Student Association President, the ULSU President, as well as one more undergraduate student elected at large. While the students are noticeably the youngest in the room, the board does a great job making everyone in the room feel equal and it is always appreciated to know that your opinions matter in such an important way.

Two very important issues which have been discussed at the Board this year have been mandatory non-instructional fee regulation as well as the "Tuition Letter". The Minister of Advanced Education had asked all universities in Alberta to submit a proposal for dealing with the implementation of new, as well as the increase of current fees universities charge. The University of Lethbridge responded with a policy which outlines a consultation process with students for these fees. However, we are of the belief that consultation only is not enough and are advocat-





ing, and will continue to advocate for students to have a larger say over this matter. Whether it is a plebiscite or a student council vote, students should have more say.

The "Tuition Letter" was a letter submitted to the provincial government by the university administration asking for tuition to be increased 2% above CPI for the next four years. We are opposed to this as it would place an extra burden on students. While 2% does not sound like much, it would mean that within 5 years, each U of L student would be paying around \$500 more per year which definitely adds up. We are of the opinion that the University and the government should stick to its own rules and not allow tuition to increase by more than CPI. Such increases above and beyond the current cap would only set a precedent and place us on a slippery slope of ever increasing tuition costs.

Every year there are many motions passed but there have been a few that very much stand out. One of the decisions made by the board this year was to approve the construction of the new Aperture Park Phase 3 residences which will give space to over 250 more students on campus. The Board approved funding for the residences over the summer and I was able to attend the ground breaking ceremony along with VP Academic, Andrew Williams, and ORS President, Kyle Hammond.

Other important decisions made this year were the hiring of our new Registrar, Don Hunt, the new Associate VP of Students, Judith Lapadat, as well as Sharon Sproule, the new legal counsel to the University.

Finally, something that may not directly affect the student population but has a large effect on how the Board works is the current search for a new Chair of the Board of Governors. The current Board Chair, Bob Turner will be

leaving us in September 2012. The Chair is crucial when it comes to the efficiency of meetings, facilitating discussion outside of meetings regarding the University of Lethbridge, as well as a very public figure of the University to the government and the general public.

It has been a pleasure working with both the Students' Union and the Board over the past year. While it may be a very intimidating position, it is well worth it both personally for the student board member, but more importantly for the student body as a whole to have a voice in the decision making process of the University of Lethbridge. 



Upass Referendum

QUESTION #1 - UPASS

"Do you support the adoption of a universal bus pass with an opt-out for students residing outside of the service area as well as for students doing practicum work outside of Lethbridge for more than three quarters of the semester, at a price of \$77.50 per semester for a one year trial period, and agree to send it to a future referendum for approval in February 2013 should this referendum be successful?"

RESULTS (referendum was defeated):

NO votes: 1863 votes - 64.58% YES votes: 1022 vote - 35.42%

The proposal for another Upass referendum came after 77% of survey respondents told the ULSU to look into

the UPass; indicating that students were becoming concerned with the rising costs of transportation.

Over the summer and into the fall, a group of students including ULSU President Zack Moline met up with Lethbridge Transit and negotiated a universal bus pass to be presented to the student body in a referendum.

On September 21, 2011 the Students' Union General

Assembly voted to send a new universal bus pass (Upass) question to referendum. With 42.32% of the student body voting in the referendum, the motion was defeated.

The defeated 2011 Upass proposal included two major additions since the last referendum in 2006. Firstly, students on practicum outside of Lethbridge, living outside the service area or taking distance learning courses would have been eligible to opt-out of the program. Secondly, if the proposal had been approved, it would have been subject to a one year term, then return to referendum in February 2013 for permanent approval.

Lethbridge Transit and the Students' Union agreed to continue to meet regularly to ensure that students are able to get the most from Lethbridge's mass transit system.







Calgary Campus Gym Pass (Fee Increase) Referendum

QUESTION #2 CALGARY CAMPUS GYM PASS (FEE INCREASE)

"Do you authorize the University of Lethbridge Students' Union to increase student fees on the Calgary Campus by \$5.00 per semester to cover a gym pass at the YWCA and allow the ULSU and YWCA to revisit and increase the fee every two years if needed, so long as it does not exceed Consumer Price Index (CPI)?

The pass would give unrestricted access to the YWCA facilities for all undergraduate students registered in one or more courses at the Calgary campus. To use the pass students would additionally be required a onetime purchase of a \$5 YWCA ID card. An opt-out will be available for students with limiting physical disabilities."

RESULTS (referendum was successful):

YES votes: 95 NO votes: 37

Shahd Mohamad, our Calgary Campus Rep worked with the YWCA to create a mutually beneficial proposal that would allow all Calgary campus students access to a YWCA unrestricted membership. The referendum was presented to students because these students do not have access to a gym or workout facility. A YWCA gym membership for students currently costs \$35 per month for individuals who possess a student ID card.

The successful referendum question was presented to students during the ULSU General Elections on March 7 to March 9, 2012. The fee increase will only affect the Calgary Campus students, therefore only Calgary Campus students were eligible to vote. The Board of Governors will be addressing the referendum results in December 2012 and if they approve it, the fee increase will then enter into force in September 2013.

ULSU General Election

The ULSU General Election process began February 6, 2012 and ended on March 9, 2012. The total voter turn out was 18%, with the Residence students having the highest participation at 46%.
